Forum on industrial development issues and side events

The Industrial Innovation Forum, the UNIDO forum on inclusive and sustainable industrial development (ISID), and the launch of the Industrial Development Report 2023 will be held in the plenary and make up this year's forum on industrial development issues. All side events are held in Plenary Hall (VIC, M-building, 1st floor). Complementing the forum on industrial development issues, a number of topical side events will focus on matters related to the mandate of UNIDO and the theme of the Conference. These additional events are designed to allow stakeholders to jointly explore how problems of a global scale can be addressed through innovative cross-border and cross-sectoral solutions. :

Industrial Innovation Forum

The Industrial Innovation Forum will lay the foundations for the discussions throughout the week. The forum will allow its Member States and other partners to engage in a strategic dialogue on key aspects of industrial development with a view to identify solutions to pressing global challenges. The Forum is designed to present to UNIDO's Member States how the new strategic priorities set under Director General Mr. Gerd Müller, guided by his vision of progress by innovation, enable impactful multi-stakeholder partnerships for holistic industrial development and economic transformation. The new priorities of ending hunger, promoting sustainable supply chains and climate action lie at the heart of the multi-stakeholder dialogue of the Forum, since achieving an inclusive and sustainable industrial development, and by extension the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), calls for a broader range of resources than any single development partner can individually provide.

Making gender equality a lived reality in industry

The 2030 Agenda includes a gender-specific goal (SDG 5) as well as gender equality and the empowerment of women as a universal principle mainstreamed throughout all the SDGs, including SDG 9 on industry, innovation and infrastructure. Gender equality and the empowerment of women constitutes a high-level priority for the Organization as reflected in its key strategic documents, including the medium-term programme framework, 2022–2025 and the programme and budgets, 2024–2025, mirroring the twin-track approach of gender-specific actions and gender mainstreaming.

Industrialization in middle-income countries: A driving force for sustainable development

Many MICs remain in the "middle-income trap" and face issues of poverty and inequality, access to finance, especially concessional finance, human capacity-building, and limited infrastructure and technology. Recent global shocks have further amplified the vulnerabilities of MICs, constraining their progress towards sustained development. Over the past 50 years, MICs have become the source of almost 50 per cent of global industrial production. However, to further their structural transformation and sustainable development agendas, MICs also need support in moving forward with the green transition. According to the World Bank country classification by income level, 105 UNIDO Member States are MICs. They constitute the largest grouping of countries the Organization assists to accelerate sustainable industrial development.

The session will build on the outcomes of a side event jointly organized by UNIDO and the Like-Minded Group for Middle-Income Countries on the occasion of the in-depth review of SDG 9 during the 2023 high-level political forum on sustainable development, held in New York. It will also build on the momentum of the recent global discussions on development cooperation with MICs held at the SDG Summit, as well as the Eighth Ministerial Meeting of the Like-Minded Group for Middle-Income Countries held on the margins of the seventy-eighth session of the United Nations General Assembly.

Industrial policy for a fair globalization: Insights from the Industrial Development Report 2024

The Industrial Development Report (IDR) is a bi-annual flagship publication and the major research output of UNIDO. The report covers the latest developments and trends in the area of industrial development in a global context, while each issue also focuses on different relevant aspects of industrial development.

The IDR 2024 addresses the theme of "Turning Challenges into Sustainable Solutions - The New Era of Industrial Policy". Increasing global awareness on industry's fundamental role in tackling key challenges of our time goes hand in hand with a strong resurgence of industrial policy. A resurgence that is primarily driven by the most industrialized countries of the world, which are taking the lead in the implementation of ambitious industrial policy packages and strategies to tackle development challenges. To achieve fair globalization, developing countries should match these efforts to avoid being sidelined in the global industrial landscape, deepening an already alarming global divide. Solidarity and political will are needed to make fair globalization happen.

The IDR 2024 assesses the progress made so far by different developing regions in the achievement of selected SDGs and highlights the role that industry can play in supporting this process. The report also portrays the current industrial policy landscape of each region and identifies areas of opportunity for future industrial policy actions to further accelerate progress. Through this comprehensive approach, the report provides valuable insights and actionable recommendations to catalyse progress toward the SDGs and to harness the transformative power of industrial development in shaping inclusive, resilient and sustainable societies.

During the event, the main findings and messages of the report will be presented and discussed with a panel of prominent global experts and regional leaders. This discussion is expected to contribute to international efforts to accelerate the achievement of the SDGs by advocating for SDG-driven industrial policies.

Other thematic events

Driving a just hydrogen transition: Key enablers for clean hydrogen uptake and de-risking of investments

Clean hydrogen is being promoted as the fuel of the future for being clean, storable and portable. While it can serve as a clean energy carrier and storage option for renewable energy, clean hydrogen also has the potential to substitute fossil fuel to decarbonize hard-to-abate economic activities and creates unique opportunities for a netzero industrial development for developing countries that have abundant renewable power potential. Achieving the 1.5°C scenario will require reaching 518 million tons of clean hydrogen production and usage annually by 2050. A ramp-up in the deployment of financing and technical assistance across the clean hydrogen supply chain is needed for developing countries to attain the full potential of socio-economic and sustainable industrial development.

UNIDO's Global Programme for Hydrogen in Industry supports developing countries and transition economies to fully benefit from the new opportunities that clean hydrogen can contribute to net-zero industrial development and local value addition. It paves the way for job creation, skills upgrading and investment mobilization, and helps drive the development of a diversified and knowledge-based economy. **Date and time**: Tuesday, 28 November 2023, 9-10 a.m. **Venue**: Plenary Hall (VIC, M-building, 1st floor)

Climate Action: Accelerating the green transition: Critical minerals, metals production and a fair future for all

Climate action and the transition to a net-zero economy will be metal-intensive: the production of minerals such as cobalt, graphite and lithium could increase by 500 per cent by 2050 in response to a growing demand for clean energy technologies. Ensuring responsible metal and mineral supply chains is a major priority in the international agenda and UNIDO has the technical expertise to assume a thought leadership and convening role.

During a Ministerial Roundtable at the second edition of the Future Minerals Forum in 2023, a key initiative for critical mineral and mining organized by the Ministry of Industry and Mineral Resources of Saudi Arabia, the Director General of UNIDO called for the establishment of a Global Alliance for Responsible Minerals. By forging such a multi-stakeholder global alliance, UNIDO would contribute to the advancement of responsible mining for the green transition and a fair future for all.

Responsible mining is aligned with the core objectives of integration and scale-up of UNIDO's mediumterm programme framework, 2022–2025. It combines two interconnected focus areas: a) climate-neutral industry and circular economy, and b) digital transformation and innovation. Minerals are the critical resource required for green transition and digitalization. On the production side, minerals are the key inputs. With regard to technology adoption, minerals are essential for the production and procurement of chips required for the deployment of technologies.

Building resilient supply chains for the energy transition

Promoting green industrialization and establishing sustainable value chains for low-carbon technologies is pivotal in the effort to decarbonize the energy and transportation sectors to advance towards the global net-zero target. The adoption of technologies like solar and storage batteries has surged over the last decade, yet supply chains for these technologies remain largely concentrated in a handful of countries. This dependency is particularly pronounced among lower-middle-income countries and will present a bottleneck to accelerate energy transition.

The participation of developing countries in global supply chains remains relatively limited. For instance, in the solar industry, the International Solar Alliance noted that solar manufacturing in the middle- and low-income countries remains limited and is primarily concentrated in South-East Asia. Data from the Global Wind Energy Council also reveals analogous trends in other critical value chains, such as wind and battery manufacturing, with China and the United States of America leading the production capacities, followed by the European Union member countries, Japan and the Republic of Korea.

AIM Global: Inclusive AI – Bridging the digital divide in industry and manufacturing

UNIDO's Global Alliance on Artificial Intelligence for Industry and Manufacturing (AIM Global) was launched on 6 July 2023 at the World Artificial Intelligence Conference held in Shanghai, China. This pioneering initiative aims to foster the responsible, sustainable and inclusive application of artificial intelligence (AI) in the industrial sector, in accordance with the United Nations Secretary-General's call to establish a Global Digital Compact that upholds shared principles for an open, free and secured digital future for all. AIM Global is a strategic initiative emphasizing the need for collaborative action towards responsible deployment of AI in addressing global challenges, making it a cornerstone to achieve inclusive and sustainable industrial growth in an era of fair globalization.

Seating arrangements

10. Delegations will be seated in English alphabetical order. The name of Kazakhstan was drawn by lot and the delegation of this Member State will therefore sit at the extreme right of the front row in the Plenary Hall, as seen from the podium.

11. Each Government delegation from all UNIDO Member States will be assigned a total of four (4) seats, with two (2) at the table and two (2) in the row behind. Specifically identified seating will be available for other participants in the session of the Conference. Other representations (observers, non-Member States of UNIDO but members of the United Nations, United Nations entities, intergovernmental organizations, and non-governmental organizations) will be allocated one (1) seat at the table and one (1) in the row behind.

12. Participants are reminded that mobile telephones should be either switched off or switched to "silent" mode during all proceedings.

Simultaneous interpretation

13. In the proceedings of the plenary and the Main Committee, interventions made in any of the official languages (Arabic, Chinese, English, French, Russian, Spanish) will be interpreted into the other official languages.

14. A participant may speak in a language other than the official languages. In this case, however, the speaker must inform the Division for Policymaking Organs in advance and provide for interpretation into one of the official languages. Interpretation into the other official languages will then be provided by the Secretariat's official interpreters.

15. Each seat in the conference halls for which simultaneous interpretation is available will be provided with a receiving set and headphones. Participants are requested not to remove that equipment from the meeting rooms so that it may be checked periodically, and the batteries may be recharged if necessary. 26. Representatives of the media – print media, photo, radio, television and film, news agencies and online media – who fully meet United Nations media accreditation requirements can be registered. Please send an email to: csi@unido.org with a copy to e.salguero-gomez@unido.org.

Commissary

27. In accordance with the Commissary Agreement between UNIDO and the Republic of Austria, only heads of delegations of Member States to meetings of or convened by UNIDO, Austrian nationals and stateless persons resident in Austria excluded, are entitled to commissary access cards for the duration of the session. If a head of delegation leaves before the end of the Conference, they should designate a new head of delegation.

28. The VIC Commissary is located in the F-building, floor -1. The Commissary is open Monday to Friday from 12 noon to 7 p.m. Access to the Commissary is limited to holders of an access card validated for Commissary access.

29. Any questions in connection with the issuing of commissary access cards should be directed to the registration desk.

Postal services

30. A post office, on the first floor of the C-building, provides all regular postal services, express mail service and some banking services, Monday through Friday from 9 to 11.15 a.m. and 12 noon to 5 p.m. Other services include express money transfers with Western Union, sale of prepaid telephone cards useable at public telephone booths and some hotel room telephones, packing material (boxes and envelopes), souvenirs from the United Nations Postal Administration, etc.

31. Telephone cards may be purchased at post offices and other locations such as newsagents or tobacco shops (Tabak-Trafik) throughout Vienna.

Banking services

32. An Austrian bank (Bank Austria) with multilingual staff offers full banking services at the VIC on the first floor of building C. The bank is open Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Friday from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. and Thursday from 9 a.m. to 5.30 p.m.

International ATM machines are available on the first floor of building C (C0113), and the ground floor of building D (DOE71).

Some banking services are also provided from 9 to 11.15 a.m. and from 12 noon to 5 p.m. by the post office on the first floor of the C-building.

Language, currency and credit cards

33. The official language of Austria is German.

34. The currency unit is the euro. The euro is subdivided into cents (100 cents = 1 euro). Most hotels and many restaurants and shops accept internationally recognized credit cards.

35. Bank notes and travellers' cheques may be brought into Austria without restriction; however, as not all currencies are in equal demand, some might not be easily convertible. Departing visitors may take with them any foreign and local currency and securities that they brought into the country. It is recommended that visitors keep receipts for major currency exchange transactions in case they need to exchange currency again before leaving the country.

VIC entry for official cars

36. Registered cars of Permanent Missions will be able to park in the VIC garage as usual. Parking facilities for non-registered cars are not available at the VIC.

37. Taxis are not permitted to access the premises of the VIC. Participants arriving at the VIC by taxi are advised to be dropped off in the side lane of Wagramer

Strasse, to walk up the stairs or ramp to enter through Gate 1 at the VIC and to walk across the plaza to the entrance of the M-building.

38. Participants without access to authorized cars are advised to use the excellent public transportation system, as the VIC is located directly next to the underground station "Kaisermühlen — Vienna International Centre" on the U1 line. Participants arriving at the VIC by underground transport (U-Bahn) should take line U-1 and get off at the station "Kaisermühlen-Vienna International Centre" and follow the signs to the VIC. A variety of public transport tickets are available. Tickets may be purchased at machines in every U-Bahn station throughout Vienna.

Medical services

39. For medical emergencies, call 22222. Medical attention is available in the clinics operated by the Joint Medical Service on the seventh floor of the F-building (telephone number +43 (1) 2600, extension 22223). For emergencies, the clinics are open anytime during regular office hours (at other times, please apply to the Security Duty Room (F0E21, number +43 (1) 26060, extension 99 or 3903)).

40. A pharmacy located next to the clinics (room F0707) is open on weekdays from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. (extension 21599).

Security advice

41. Participants are advised not to leave briefcases and other personal items unattended. *Suspicious objects should be reported to security immediately.*

Lost and found

42. During the Conference, a lost and found office will operate on the ground floor of the F-building, room F0E18.

Catering services

43. The M-building catering services are as follows:

Cellular telephones and computers

47. Delegates are invited to keep their cellular telephones switched to the silent mode inside conference rooms, as they cause radio frequency interferences in the sound system, adversely affecting the quality of interpretation and recordings of proceedings.

Cloakroom

48. Delegates are kindly requested to leave their coats in the cloakroom on the ground floor of the M-building.




