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NOTE

The Tunisian National Centre for Industrial Studies as well as UNIDO under its Industrial Investment Promotion Programme will also be pleased to assist both local sponsors and foreign contributors with further elaboration and additional studies as required.

I. INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT

REFRACTORY INDUSTRY IN TUNISIA

The four-year Development Plan for 1967/72 includes a project for the creation of the first refractory production unit in Tunisia.

II. MARKET

The output of the factory at Sidi-Bachra would be completely absorbed by the local market and is therefore a substitute for existing importations. No other source of local production exists, and Tunisia is at present obliged to take the whole of its requirements from foreign supplies.

III. FOREIGN

The promoter of the project is the Société Tunisienne Industrielle de Matériaux de Construction (SITIMCO), of 2 rue Joseph Giron in Tunis. The form of foreign contribution, whether technical, financial or commercial, has not been specified; this is a matter for negotiation between interested parties and the promoter. It should be borne in mind that the laws governing foreign investment place no limit on the foreign share of the equity nor on the degree of foreign control in management.





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
