

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An Introductory Note.

The agenda is organized so that maintenance as such is first discussed. The main aspects of maintenance activities, namely economical, engineering, and organizational aspects are then discussed, each in a separate session. A complete day is alloted to each session. Presentation of background papers relevant to the aspect under discussion will take place in the morning with a short discussion to follow each presentation to allow participants to have more information on the subject presented. A general debate will follow in the afternoon of the same day on the particular aspect as a whole (for the managerial aspect, the debate will take place on the morning of Sunday, 15 November since the Mercator Halle will not be available to the Symposium on the afternoon of Saturday, 14 November). An issue paper has been prepared by the UNIDO Secretariat for each aspect of maintenance to help participants in the debate and to outline a number of issues suggested for discussion. It is not claimed that the background papers presented and the issue papers cover all relevant points of the aspect under discussion or all the issues which could be raised and discussed. It is thus hoped that, in addition to the relevant background and issue rapers, the background and experience of participants will surely be of great value in bringing the standard of the debate to the required level.

The different subjects relevant to maintenance are divided into groups under the different aspects only for convenience. There is no sharp division line between the different aspects and many subjects are certainly the concern of economists, managers and top technical personnel.


