



1. This is a short description of the evaluation questionnaire on SIDA-supported training courses and seminars, with particular reference to training programmes sponsored jointly by UNIDO and SIDA.

#### I. BACKGROUND

- 2. Since it came into being in 1965, the Swedish International Development Authority(SIDA) has sponsored a number of training courses in fields like agriculture, cooperation, education, family planning and industry. They have normally been intended as supplementary training for professionals from developing countries in africa, asia and Latin America who have completed their basic training and have a permanent professional affiliation in their home countries. The courses and seminars have increasingly been located to developing regions; sometimes they take place in Sweden, for example in the field of industry.
- 3. At first, the training courses in Sweden were not systematically evaluated. Soon this was found to be wholly unsatisfactory, particularly as the course programme kept expanding and some courses tended to be repeated annually. As a result, SIDA invited the Institute of Pedagogy at the University of Stockholm to work out a questionnaire suitable primarily for all courses and seminars held in Sweden. A pilot study was made, based on interviews with participants in a few engoing courses. The first version materialized in 1968; in all essentials it is the same as the one currently used, dated July 20, 1970(see annex. I). Details have been changed; the questionnaire can easily be amended when useful suggestions come up. As to UNIDO/SIDA activities, it has been used for the following courses: Electrical Engineering since 1968, Pulp and Paper since 1969 and Maintenance Management since 1971.

#### II. PURPOSE

- 4. The purpose of the questionnaire is twofold; to give the course participants an opportunity to express their opinion whether or not the course is valuable enough to be repeated, and if so what major or minor revisions should be made in the course programme. It contains four parts in order of increasing significance: Pre-course information; Social aspects; Course content; Relevance and applicability.
- 5. The questionnaire is constructed as a mixture of closed and open questions. The closed questions are of primary importance they permit an overview of the participants' feelings en items that SIDA believes to be of vital importance (centent, relevance eto). The open questions are supplementary, giving each participants an opportunity to express his essential criticism of the course and to formulate unique suggestions for improvement.

#### III. USE

- 6. The questionnaire does not speak entirely for itself; the way to use it effectively is not self-evident. In SIDa's experience, by far the best way is to gather all the course participants on one of the very last days of the course to complete the questionnaire. They should be assisted by a SIDa representative who explains the purpose of the exercise and replies to any questions the participants may want to raise.
- 7. For each course, there are normally some questions that do not apply; answers to these should simply be left out. Clarifications should be previded each participant immediately to ensure a high motivation for each participant to fill out the questions as thoroughly as he can. The whole procedure takes 1-1 1/2 hour.

- 8. Attempts to distribute the questionnaire individually have proved ineffective; in that way, fewer copies tend to be submitted, some too late to be useful.
- 9. It cannot be emphasized strongly enough that SIDA's aim is not to pin down the participants for their views or feelings. Consequently, the answers should be summarized by SIDA into one document, which is then distributed among the course directors, sponsors, participants and other interested parties. In the summary, no mames or other references to individual participants should appear. The reason is clear: positive judgements on the courses are of value only when the participants feel free to state their negative views as well.

### IV. RESULTS

- 10. It is obvious that the summary of the participants' views does not amount to a course evaluation only part of it. It is essential that it should be supplemented by other means of information. SIDA representatives should visit the course repeatedly to observe the training, discuss with directors and participants and try to form an impression of the way the course is developing. The director and his staff should submit a written course report after the course is over. Participants who wish to volunteer course reports, should be encouraged to do so. Taken jointly, all these pieces of information may be said to constitute an evaluation of the course proper when compared with the aim of the course as originally formulated. On the other hand, they do not claim to be an evaluation of the secondary effects of the course in the participants' home countries.
- 11. One may well question the willingness and even ability of a course participant to express openly his true feelings about the course. The reliability of the answers can hardly be stated with any scientific accouracy. However, to a great extent the answers confirm information that

has already been received during the course on a more personal basis.

Thus the oral and the written information supplement each other.


Participants are usually quite willing to exchange views openly with SIDA representatives as long as the course is going on and they can still affect the programme. At the end of the course they are often less inclined to state any negative views directly; an opportunity to do so more formally in writing — anonymously, if they wish — tends to facilitate the expression of oriticism.

personal impressions have proved quite enlightening as the UNIDO/SIDA joint course programme over the years. The training course in Electrical Engineering, Pulp and Paper, and Maintenance Management have all been met with such appreciation on the part of the participants that SIDA has not found cause to discontinue its support to either of them. A number of criticisms have been voiced, however, some of which have lead to important revisions of the course programmes (balance theory/practice, location of course, choice of instructors etc).

#### V. FUTURE EVALUATION

as an indispensable part of the planning of SIDA's activities, including SIDA-supported courses and seminars. The present questionnaire will continue to be used as long as it is found to serve its purpose reasonably well. In the light of new experience, revisions will continuously be made. So for example, it might prove desirable to construct a somewhat less detailed version for courses repeated annually; possibly also another variety for course neld cutside Sweden.

- 14. Even more importantly, evaluation of the course proper should whenever feasible be combined with attempts to estimate the secondary effects in the home countries. To this effect, several measures have been discussed, to some extent even tried. A year or two after a course, a short questionnaire could be circulated to participants and their employers; it should be less detailed but might include some of the items on "Content" and "Relevance and Applicability" in SIDA's regular questionnaire. On-the-spot visits to participants and their employers could be undertaken by course directors and SIDA/UNIDO representatives. Regional seminars for former course participants could be arranged, to serve the combined purpose of follow-up and evaluation.
- 15. If all these measures materialise, there might eventually take shape a system for the evaluation of SIDA-supported courses of the type co-sponsored by UNIDO. In the oreation of such a system, working out the SIDA questionnaire was no more than a first but a necessary step.






