

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INTRODUCTION

- 1. The Second General Conference of UNIDO held at Lima, Peru, in March 1975 recommended that UNIDO establish a system of continuing consultations between developed and developing countries.
- 2. At its meeting in April/May 1978, the Industrial Development Board authorized the UNIDO secretariat to convene the First Consultation Meeting on the Petrochemical Industry in 1979.
- 3. To complete preparations for this meeting, a Global Preparatory Meeting was convened 27 to 29 November 1978. The Meeting recommended the establishment by the UNIDO of a Working Group on the World Supply and Demand of petrochemicals. (ID/WG.291/2, para.12-15, which are reproduced below).
- I. RECOMMENDATION OF THE GLOBAL PREPARATORY MEETING TO ESTABLISH A WORKING GROUP ON THE WORLD SUPPLY AND DEMAND OF PETROCHEMICALS
- 4. The Neeting saw a need to prepare on a world-wide basis forecasts of demand for petrochemicals and the production capacity available to supply petrochemicals. Such forecasts should be regularly updated. Initially, 10-year forecasts should be prepared based on a realistic consolidation of existing forecasts made by individual countries or groups of countries. The world-wide demand/supply capacity position in basic petrochemicals should be examined first, followed by an examination of selected intermediate and final products.

- 5. The Meeting therefore recommended that UNIDO discuss with OECD, CMEA and OPEC their co-operation in establishing a joint working group on the world supply and demand of petrochemicals with the following terms of reference:
 - (a) To prepare and regularly update a 10-year forecast of demand for petrochemicals, expressed in terms of demand for basic petrochemicals, in major consuming countries, and at regional and world levels;
 - (b) To prepare and regularly update a 10-year forecast of feedstocks available for the production of basic petrochemicals at regional and world levels;
 - (c) To prepare and regularly update estimates of existing capacities to supply basic petrochemicals in major producing countries, and at regional and world levels;
 - (d) To extend the demand/supply exercise described above to selected intermediate and end-products as appropriate.
- 6. The Meeting further recommended that UNIDO, as secretariat of the proposed working group, should invite to participate in the working group, as required:
 - (a) Representatives of selected individual countries that are large consumers or large producers of petrochemicals;
 - (b) Representatives of regional groups of countries such as the Andean Group, ASEAN, OAPEC etc.;
 - (c) Representatives of industry associations or federations formed by groups of countries such as CEFIC;
 - (d) Representatives of other organizations of the United Nations system such as ECE and UNCTAD.
- 7. The Meeting recommended that the UNIDO secretariat should submit the above proposal to the First Consultation Meeting, together with the response of the organizations to the invitations of the UNIDO secretariat to co-sponsor the establishment of the working group.

- II. FURTHER INFORMATION RELATING TO THE PROPOSAL TO ESTABLISH A WORKING GROUP
- 8. The Global Preparatory Meeting clearly outlined the terms of reference of the proposed working group and its possible composition. The matters remaining to be clarified are:
 - (a) The joint sponsors;
 - (b) The form of presentation of the information collected;
 - (c) The petrochemical products to be covered;
 - (d) When the Working Group should be convened.

The Joint Sponsors

9. When this paper was finalized (23 February 1979), OPEC had responsed to UNIDO's invitation to co-sponsor the Working Group. OPEC's replied positively, confirming the importance that the Organization attached to such a working group and indicating that its contribution would be that of a technical observer. The replies of OECD and CMEA will be reported to the Consultation Meeting.

Presentation of the information

10. The ways in which information on (a) the world demand for a petrochemical product, (b) the world production capacity and (c) the world available supply that could be presented are shown in Tables 1, 2 and 3. The countries falling within each region are listed in Table 4.

The petrochemical products to be covered

11. It is suggested that authorative information should be worked out on the following 8 basic petrochemical products and also on some or all of the intermediate and final products listed below. Since the tasks are inter-related they may need to be conducted at the same time.

Basic petrochemical products

Olefins: ethylene, propylene, butadiene Aromatics: benzene, paraxylene, orthoxylene Gas synthesis products: methanol, ammonia

Intermediate petrochemical products

Fibre intermediates: acrylonitrile, caprolactam, DMT, TPA
Other intermediates: styrene, vinyl chloride

Final petrochemical products

Plastics: PVC, high and low density polyethylene, polypropylene, polystyrene
Synthetic Rubbers: styrene butadiene rubber (SBR)

Synthetic Fibres: acrylic, polyamide, polyester fibres.

12. The UNIDO World-wide Study of the Petrochemical Industry Vol. II Appendices has collected the basic information needed to conduct work on those 23 products. The information was prepared in mid-1977 and now needs to be updated. For example, UNIDO's recent estimates show that total world capacity to produce ethylene in 1980 is now likely to be lower than the total that was forecast in mid-1977. This shows the importance of the Working Group up-dating the information it prepares once or perhaps twice a year.

When Meetings of the Working Group should be convened

13. It is anticipated that the Working Group would need to meet twice in 1979 in June and November. At the first meeting, ways to achieve a uniform approach to estimating available supply and forecasting demand would be discussed. Provision is made in Table 1 for projected demand 10 years ahead to consider three possible scenarios; the economic parameters and other assumptions on which those scenarios are to be based would have to be agreed by the Working Group at its first meeting.

III. RECORMENDATION OF THE CONSTITUTION MEETING

- 14. The Consultation Meeting is invited to endorse the proposal of the Global Preparatory Meeting that UNIDO establish a Joint Working Group on the World Demand for and Supply of Petrochemicals with the terms of reference outlined in para. 5 above.
- 15. It is further invited to indicate which petrochemical products might be covered initially, how the information should be presented, bearing in mind that information on major consuming and producing countries as well as regional totals were suggested by the Global Preparatory Neeting.


