
### Introduction

The present document presented in the form of an addendum to document ID/B/43, updates the Report on 1968 Activities as regards operational activities. Details of specific projects under implementation during 1968 have already been given in the main report (ID/B/43), arranged by sources of funds, geographical regions and fields of activity. Changes recorded in these projects have not been of sufficient significance to warrant a new listing since the various programmes of technical assistance within which these projects fall were approved prior to the year of implementation. The changes that occurred in these programmes during the last quarter of 1968 as a result of inter-agency transfers or cancellations of certain projects at the request of Governments were only minor; their effect on the over-all commitments are reflected in the revised tables included in this addendum. The only exception is the Special Industrial Services programme: in the course of continuous programming procedure, new SIS projects were approved in the last quarter of 1968. These additional projects appear in the special report on the SIS for 1968 (document ID/B/43/Add.1).

# Progress of implementation as of 31 December 1968

- 2. A special effort was made in the second half of the year to accelerate the delivery of technical assistance through the adoption of arrangements aimed at expediting and streamlining the processes of recruitment of field personnel, including the establishment at UNIDO headquarters of the necessary machinery for this purpose (see document ID/B/53 "Proposals for expediting and improving the recruitment of project personnel").
- 3. Under the Regular Programme, the 1968 value of which was \$991,400, commitments by the end of the year amounted to \$987,441. This figure represents an adjustment of the amount of \$1,027,760, given in document ID/B/43,

The cut-off date of the Report on 1968 Activities was 30 September for the operational activities and 1 December for the non-operational activities activities. As the changes that occurred in the non-operational activities described last month of the year were very minor, the present decement convertate only on the progress of implementation of field projects from 1 October to 31 December 1968.



through offsetting of the projects' local costs accruing to the programme.

The delivery of the programme may therefore be considered complete.

- 4. The value of the UNDP/TA projects in 1968 was \$3,125,813. This is slightly higher than the figure reported in document ID/B/43 due to the fact that certain anticipated inter-agency transfers did not materialize. The breakdown of the resources available under this programme is given in table 1 of decument ID/B/43 and includes a sum of \$548,332 carried over from 1967, the first year of the biennial programme 1967-1968. Commitments under the programme by the end of the year amounted to \$3,090,336. The balance of unused resources includes the unspent balances of unconvertible currencies which will most likely be applied to 1969 activities.2
- 5. The 1968 annual expenditure target for UNDP/SF projects under implementation by UNIDO was set at \$3,561,382 at the start of the year. Of this sum, actual expenditures amounted to \$2,729,900 by the end of the year. In addition, there were \$1,394,519 in outstanding commitments or obligations incurred in 1968 whose expenditure extended beyond 1968, such as the salaries of experts appointed in 1968.
- 6. Details of the progress of implementation of the Special Industrial Services programme are given in document ID/B/43/Add.1.
- 7. Table 1 below gives an updated summary of the resources available and commitments made under the various programmes of technical assistance mentioned above. This table supersedes the one given on page 20 of document ID/B/43. In table 2 below, which complements table 2 on page 25 of ID/B/43, a distribution of the commitments made under the various programmes is given by geographical regions.





of UNIDO, by regionsa/





- 8. During 1968 UNIDO provided under the various programmes the services of 479 experts, including UNIDO staff members, for a total of 3,368 man-months, to developing countries. Table 3 below gives the number of experts and man-months in the field during 1968, by sources of funds and by geographical regions. It should be noted that the above figures included 60 experts whose contracts extend into 1969 under the UNDP/TA component (involving 350 man-months) and 7 experts under the Regular Programme for 23 man-months financed from 1968 funds.
- programmes in various fields of industry. Out of this total, nominations were received from developing countries and placement arranged by 31 December for 279 fellows, for a total of 1,219 man-months. Table 4 below gives the number of fellowship posts established under the different programmes for 1968 and the corresponding number of nominations made. It will be observed that the number of established posts has been revised upwards from the figure given in table 4 on page 29 of ID/B/43. This is due to additional posts requested by Covernments since 30 September 1968, the cut-off date for ID/B/43. Implementation of fellowship posts established under UNDP/TA and the Regular Programme has been 100 per cent. The unimplemented balance under UNDP/SF will be carried forward for implementation in subsequent years.
- 10. Taking the field operations of UNIDO as a whole, the value of UNIDO field activities under the various programmes mentioned above amounted in 1968 to about \$10.3 million. This amount includes a carry—over from 1967 of \$548,332 under the UNDP/TA programme, \$263,633 Funds—in-Trust, and \$1,816,700 worth of projects approved during 1968 under the SIS programme. Total expenditures and commitments made under these programmes during the name year amounted to about \$10.2 million, including outstanding commitments made under the UNDP/SP programme and actual expenditures made under the SIS programme.




