ADOPTION OF THE RULE OF PROCEDURE OF THE BOARD (continued)

Rule 18

After a procedural discussion in which <u>Mr. MARTONEGORO</u> (Indonesia), <u>Mr. KOFF1</u> (Ivory Coast), <u>Mr. KASATKIN</u> (Union of Soviet Socialist Republics), <u>Mr. BELEOKEN</u> (Cameroon), <u>Mr. VLADOV</u> (Bulgaria), <u>Mr. PISANI MASSAMORMILE</u> (Italy), <u>Mr. WARSAMA</u> (Somalia), <u>Mr. FERMANDINI</u> (Peru), <u>Mr. CHADHA</u> (India), <u>Sir Edward WARNER</u> (United Kingdom), <u>Mr. OLUMIDE</u> (Migeria), <u>Mr. LUBBERS</u> (Metherlands) and <u>Mr. KNAMACHET</u> (Kuwait) took part, <u>the PRESIDENT</u> invited the Board to vote on rule 18.

At the request of the representative of the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics, the vote was taken by roll-call.

The United States of America, having been drawn by lot by the President, was called upon to vote first.

In favour: United States of America, Uruguay, Argentina, Austria, Belgium, Brasil, Bulgaria, Cameroon, Canada, Chile, Colombia, Cuba, Czechoslovakia, Federal Republic of Germany, Finland, Prance, Guinea, India, Indonesia, Iran, Italy, Ivory Coast, Japan, Jordan, Kuwait, Netherlands, Nigeria, Pakistan, Peru, Nomania, Rwanda, Somalia, Spain, Sudan, Sweden, Switzerland, Trinidad and Tobago, Turkey, Union of Soviet Socialist Republics, United Arab Republic, United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland.

Rule 18 of the rules of procedure was adopted by 41 votes to none.

### Rule 19

<u>Mr. KOFFI</u> (Ivory Coast) proposed that rule 19 should be put to the vote first, and then, if necessary, the new text proposed for that rule, which appeared in paragraph 40 of the report of the Sessional Committee on rules of procedure, should be put to the vote.

<u>Mr. BRADLEY</u> (Argentina) said that he shared the view of the representative of the Ivory Coast. He recalled that the text which had been proposed by the Group of Twenty-Five had not received the unanimous support of that Group; Argentina, among others, had entered reservations.

Mr. CHADHA (India) pointed out that the text proposed by the Group of Twenty-Five was an amendment and that, as such, it must be put to the vote first.

Mr. BELEOKEN (Cameroon), Mr. BADAWI (United Arab Republic), Mr. AHMED (Pakistan) and Mr. PATRIOTA (Brazil) supported the view expressed by the Indian representative.

The PRESIDENT invited the Board to vote by show of hands on whether or not that text was an amendment.

The Board decided by 21 votes to 16, with 1 abstention, that the new text proposed for rule 19 was an amendment.

The PRESIDENT invited the Board to vote on the new text. At the request of the representative of the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics, the vote was taken by roll-call.

Jordan, having been drawn by lot by the President, was called upon to vote first.

Abstaining: Turkey.

The new text proposed for rule 19 was adopted by 22 votes to 17, with 1 abstention.

The PRESIDENT suggested that the Board should adopt the rules of procedure as a whole, as amended.

The rules of procedure, as amended, were adopted.

<u>Mr. SANCHEZ</u> (Cuba), <u>Mr. KASATKIN</u> (Union of Soviet Socialist Republics), <u>Mr. DUMITRESCU</u> (Romania), <u>Mr. MUZIK</u> (Czechoslovakia) and <u>Mr. VLADOV</u> (Bulgaria) expressed reservations concerning rules 73 and 74 which, in their view, were contrary to the principle of universality.

<u>Mr. BRADLEY</u> (Argentina), <u>Mr. KOFFI</u> (Ivory Coast) and <u>Mr. MONTERO</u> (Uruguay) recalled that their respective delegations had not been sponsors of the text of rule 19 which had just been adopted.

<u>Sir Edward WARNER</u> (United Kingdom) expressed the reservations of his delegation, which did not approve of the system established by virtue of that text.

<u>Mr. ABE</u> (Japan) entered reservations as to the way in which the rules of procedure of the General Assembly had been applied during the present discussion.

Mr. KOFFI (Ivory Coast) moved the adjournment of the meeting.

The PRESIDENT put the motion to the vote.

The motion of the delegation of the Ivory Coast was adopted by 19 votes to 11, with 6 abstentions.
