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
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

LATROLXICTION

- 1. The Leather and Leather Products Industry Panel was established by the Industrial Development Board after the First Consultation on the Leather and Leather Products Industry, to assist in the preparation and oversee implementation of the recommendations and conclusions of the United Nations Industrial Development Organization (UNIDO) Consultations in this sector.
- 2. The Second Consultation, held at Cologne, Federal Republic of Germany, from 23 to 26 June 1980, recognized the usefulness of the work of the Panel, and requested the UNIDO secretariat, inter alia, to establish an Industrial Working Group within the Panel to elaborate ground rules for the rationalization of world production, marketing and trade in this sector.
- 3. Since the Second Consultation, UNIDO has reconstituted the membership of the Panel in order to achieve better geographical and subsectoral participation, and has established the Industrial Working Group of the Panel from among the members.
- 4. The First Meeting of the Judustrial Working Group was held at UNIDO handquarters, Vienna, Austria, on 23 and 24 November 1981, and the fifth session of the Panel was held from 25 to 27 November 1981.
- 5. At its fifth session, the Panel reviewed follow-up action to the recommendations and conclusions of the Second Consultation.

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I. ORGANIZATION OF THE MENTING

A. Opening of the meeting

- 6. The fifth session of the Panel was attended by 20 participants from 15 countries and four international organizations (see annex I).
- 7. The session was opened by the outgoing chairman, Mr. Milin Zhang (China).

II. REVIEW OF THE FOLLOW-UP TO THE SECOND CONSULTATION (Agenda items 5 (i) to 5 (iy))

- A. Report of the Industrial Working Group on the Rationalization of
 World Production, Marketing and Trade in the
 Leather and Leather Products Industry
- 10. The Industrial Working Group considered the UNIDO working paper, UNIDO/PC.23. Discussion focused on two possible measures which had been proposed to improve among other things, the conditions of the global supply of raw materials, i.e. the "International Council of Tanners' (ICT) Do trine on Rules for Fair Trading and Access to Markets" and the International Hides and Skins Development Scheme, proposed by the UNIDO Second Consultation on the Leather and Leather Products Industry. The following conclusions of the Industrial Working Group were adopted by the Panel, after detailed discussion of the draft recommendations:
- (a) With respect to the ICT Doctrine, the possible positive and negative effects of the Doctrine on production and trade in leather and leather products were considered. It was concluded that the position of developed and developing countries was so varied with respect to raw material availability and levels of development in the leather and leather products industry, that consideration needs to be given to several parameters governing the development of the industry before appropriate ground rules could be adopted by the Panel. These parameters would include:
 - (i) Production and trade in raw hides and skins;
 - (ii) Prevailing was with in the trade of leather and leather products;
 - (iii) The effects of mest production and trade on the availability of hides and skins;
 - (iv) The effects of a liberalized trade régime on the different groups of developed and developing countries;
- (b) It was recommended that UNIDO, in collaboration with the international organizations concerned, carry out additional studies which would allow the preparation of alternative proposals to the ICT Doctrine; these should be compatible with principles established in the United Nations. The proposals should be submitted to subsequent sessions of the Working Group of the Leather and Leather Products Industry Panel for their consideration;
- (c) In discussing the problems of financing the International Hides and Skins Development Scheme, it was concluded that:
 - (i) There is a need for the involvement of the international business community interested in the scheme in its implementation through, inter alia, the contribution of expertise, initial limited funding and other relevant support required to launch the scheme;

- (ii) There is a need for joint action by the United Nations agencies concerned and the international business community interested in the scheme, to assess the financial resources required to implement the scheme under a given programme of action, and to seek sources of financing.
- 11. The UNIDO secretarist should undertake the necessary steps to answer proper co-ordination of the above, it was noted that the implementation of the scheme is within the sphere of responsibility of the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations (FAO).

B. Progress under the International Hides and Skins Development Scheme

12. The Panel discussed at lergth the financing possibilities for the International Hides and Skins Development Scheme. It also noted with interest that attempts were currently being, made to find ways of including hides and skins in the Integrated Programs for Commodities (IPC) of UNCTAD and to make this commodity group eligible for financing from the Second Account of the Common Fund, once it was operative. In this context, it welcomed the request made by the Committee on Commodity Problems (CCP) of FAO, to the Director General of that United Mations agency, to explore the implications of setting up an Intergovernmental Group on Hides and Skins which could become a designated Intergovernmental Commodity Body (ICB) for sponsoring projects to the Common Fund. The Panel expressed its hope that the UNIDO secretariat would bring to the attention of the Director General of FAO its desire for a speedy follow-up to the request of the CCP in view of, first, the serious quality and waste problems faced in the hides and skins sector and, secondly, of possible funding of projects from the Second Account for alleviating these problems.

C. Progress in the improvement of statistical intelligence for hides and skins and derived products

13. The Panel was informed of the results of the FAO Ad Hoc Working Party on Statistical Intelligence for Raw and Processed Hides and Skins, held at Rome in May 1981. It welcomed the endorsement of the report by the FAO Co mittee on Commodity Problems and the recommendations of the Working Furty in September 1981, and associated itself with these recommendations. The Panel was took note of a synthesis of recent market trends and the short-term outlook for hides and skins which was prepared specifically for the fifth session, in

advance of its official sublication date. The Panel expressed its appreciation of the Tilot work carried out by the FAO secretarist in the complex field of the collection of statistical data, and making them coherent and comparable. In particular, it appreciated the two world compendia, one containing a time series of production and trade of raw mides and skins, leather and footwear for over 120 countries, and the other containing conversion ratios for weight and surface yields of raw and tanned hides and skins for these countries. The Proel expressed the need for maintaining the momentum of this work and encouraged FAO to continue to improve and expand the data base made available so far.

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- 14. In response to the Ad Hoc Working Party's suggested survey of global tanning capacity, the Panel felt that such a survey was unnecessary because of:
- (a) The difficulty of evaluating tanning capacity in individual plants and countries, which may introduce serious statistical errors into such a survey;
- (b) The dynamic nature of the industry, where frequent changes in operational plants were being witnessed;
- (c) The questionable usefulness of global figures in national planning for the development of the tanning sector.

D. UNIDO draft checklist for contractual agreements in the footwear sector between enterprises from developed and developing countries

- 15. The Panel considered the draft checklist prepared by the UNIDO secretariat, and approved the approach adopted. In addition to minor textual changes in the introduction, the secretariat was asked to pay particular attention to including the following points in the various agreements considered:
- (a) The time-frame for the implementation of projects and the applicability of performance guarantees;
- (b) Specification of technical assistance during the start-up of production, to be provided by the seller of knowhow;
 - (c) Secrecy of proprietary knowhow;
- (d) Cost sharing of project feasibility studies between the buyer and seller of plant, equipment or knowhow.
- 16. The Panel took note of the UNCTAD studies on the transfer of technology, and recommended that a bibliography of related literature should be appended to the checklist.

17. The International Labour Organisation (ILO) representative recalled paragraph 8, page 11 of the report of the Second Consultation, and said thus

the ILO would later subsit substantive comments for inclusion in the checklist.

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18. The Panel recommended that the UNIDO secretariat prepare the document for general distribution to Governments, inductry, and the various institutions concerned, and that it develop similar charklists for the tanning and leather goods sectors, for consideration by the sixth session of the P nel.

E. Report on UNIDO technical assistance projects in the establishment of production and design units and in the provision of management training in developing countries

- 19. The UNIDO secretariat presented a summary paper on technical assistance, ID/WG.353/3, "UNIDO Technical Assistance Activities in the Field of Leather and Leather Products as of end September 1981". This report was prepared in order to inform Pauel members of new and ongoing projects initiated by UNIDC, in response to the Second Constitution's recommendations for the setting up of production and design units and the provision of management training to developing countries. The members of the Panel congratulated the secretariat on the quality of the technical assistance that had been provided which, it was felt, was making a significant contribution to the development objectives of the countries concerned. The Panel concluded that the specific projects mentioned were in keeping with the recommendations of the Second Consultation and that good progress had been made with respect to the recommendations mentioned above.
- 20. Finally, it was noted that co-operation between the International Trade Centre (ITC), FAO and UNIDO in technical assistance projects in the leather and leather products industry was excellent. The ILO representative expressed the wish that co-operation between UNIDO and ILO in this sector should be further strengthened.

F. Other business

Utilization of pigskins

21. One participant drew the attention of the session to the potential of pigskins as a raw material source for the industry. It was pointed out that several enterprises in the United States of America were willing to supply the industries of developing countries with technical assistance and to enter into

long-term selling arrangements for pigukins. In view of the sensitive nature of the social implications of the utilization of pigskirs as a raw material for certain cultural groups, it was concluded that collaboration in this area could best be pursued on a bilateral basis between the concerned enterprises and those developing countries which wished to develop the leather industry on the basis of pigskin supplies from the United States.

22. The Panel also took note of the study being carried out by the United Nations Conference on Trade and Development (UNCTAD) on Structural Adjustment, Protection and International Trade in the Leather and Leather Products Industry, which would be submitted to the tenth session of the Committee on Manufactures in October 1982.

Sixth session of the Panel

- 23. It was proposed that the sixth session of the Leather and Leather Products Industry Panel be convened in October or November 1982, and the Second Meeting of the Industrial Working Group should take place prior to the session. The UNIDO secretariath agreed to consider this suggestion. A provisional agendation the sixth session of the Panel was then adopted (see annex III).
- 24. It was agreed that the sixth session of the Panel consider the health and safety of workers as an item for discussion, and the ILO secretariat was requested to present an appropriate report on the issue. The Panel uggested that environmental problems of the letter industry should also be included as an item for discussion by the sixth session. UNIDO informed the Panel that an earlier UNIDO study— was being updated in consultation with the United Nations Environmental Programme (UNEP), and that it would be presented to the sixth session.
