### I. ORGANIZATION OF THE MEETING

### Representation:

The Meeting was attended by 243 participants from 23 Islamic countries as well as by 30 representatives from international organizations, national and regional financial institutions.

The list of participants is attached as Annex III.

### Opening of the Meeting

The Meeting was formally inaugurated by H.E. Mr. Kaya Erdem, Deputy Prime Minister of the Republic of Turkey who, on behalf of the Government and people of Turkey, welcomed the participants to the Meeting and to Turkey.

He explained that the Meeting for the Promotion of Joint Venture among Islamic Countries represented a new phase in economic and technical co-operation between Islamic countries, and expressed the hope that it would lead to the realisation of many joint venture projects between all brotherly states of the Islamic World. He expressed the Government's thanks to the United Nations Industrial Development Organization (UNIDO), the Islamic Chamber of Commerce, Industry and Commodity Exchange (ICCICE) and the Union of Chambers of Commerce, Industry, Maritime Commerce and Commodity Exchanges of Turkey (UCCET) whose combined efforts had led to the successful organization of the meeting in Istanbul.

H.E. Mr. Kaya Erdem referred to the efforts being made by his Government to promote economic and technical co-operation between Turkey and other member states of the Organization of the Islamic Conference. He explained that the potential for co-operation among the Islamic countries was very vast, if countries would only take advantage of the many possibilities that exist. He also referred to the complementarity in the economies of the Islamic countries as further reason and justification for forging stronger economic and technical ties among the countries. He explained that a country like Turkey which has reached a reasonably advanced state of development had a lot to offer to other less advanced Islamic countries through joint venture co-operation projects. He further explained that joint venture co-operation should extend beyond the mere provision of capital and should include other areas such as technology transfer, training and manpower development, export markets, etc.

In conclusion, H.E. Mr. Erdem referred to the on-going co-operation programme between Turkey and a number of African countries whereby a Government allocation totaliz~ some 10 million US dollars has been made available to finance suitably identified bilateral co-operation projects in the African countries, particularly those countries affected by draught and famine.

Mr. Ali Coskun, President of UCCET, thanked and welcomed the representatives of friendly and brotherly Islamic countries to Istanbui and to the Meeting for Promotion of Joint Ventures among Islamic countries.

He referred to the cultural and historical ties between Turkey and the Islamic countries which have contributed to strengthening mutual friendship and brotherhood since many centuries. He added that Turkey had taken major steps in the economic and social fields, had entered an era of development with a new approach for advancement, and was in a position of constituting a bridge between the Islamic countries and the European Economic Community. Furthermore, the various resources and potentialities of Turkey could be used for the benefit of all the Islamic countries. Developing countries, in general, and OIC Member States, in particular, should join hands and mobilise their resources for their mutual development, so as to benefit from each other's possibilities. Mr. Coskun referred to the particular significance and uniqueness of this meeting, which was the first ever to bring together investors and investing friends, private enterprises and entrepreneurs, financial institutions, project sponsors, etc. of OIC Member States. He expressed the hope that this type of arrangement would lead to actual and concrete co-operation agreements on financing know-how, transfer of technology and investment at project levels. He assured the participants of the full support of UCCET which has the responsibility of representing Turkish industry - both private and public - and hoped that the meeting would lead to healthy and fruitful conclusions from the bilateral discussions and negotiations. The success of the meeting would constitute a good basis for the enhancement of solidarity and co-operation within the Islamic World.

He concluded by thanking both UNIDO and ICCICE for bringing this historic meeting to Turkey, and thanked all delegates for their participation in the meeting.

Sheikh Ismail Abudawood, President of the ICCICE, welcomed with great pleasure all participants to the meeting. Being aware of the role that the private sector can play in the economic development of all Islamic states, the Islamic Chamber firmly believes that joint ventures and mutual assistance among Member countries are the basis for a harmonious development of the whole Islamic Ummah. He further emphasized the considerable progress made by Turkey in the field of economic co-operation, under the able guidance of His Excellency General Kenan Evren, President of the Turkish Republic and Head of the Permanent Committee for the Economic Co-operation of the OIC. Turkey has substantially contributed to strengthening economic co-operation among Islamic countries.

The President of ICCICE referred to the technical assistance provided by UNIDO to the Islamic Chamber and expressed his deep gratitude and appreciation to the Organization and to its officials for their valuable assistance and co-operation.

Referring to the First Ministerial Consultation on Industrial Co-operation among OIC Member States held in Istanbul in February 1982, Mr. Abudawood stated that one of the principal tasks of the Islamic Chamber was the identification and promotion of joint venture projects in Member countries. He expressed the conviction that the present meeting would facilitate the mobilization and channeling of industrial investment resources available within the selected less developed Islamic countries by attracting the inflow of foreign capital and other resources needed for the implementation of the specific industrial projects presented by the countries.

He added that the meeting provided an excellent opportuny to the representatives and sponsors of industrial projects from the selected less developed Islamic countries to come in contact with prospective investors from selected more advanced Islamic countries as well as with representatives of industrial firms, financial institutions and international agencies.

In conclusion, Sheikh Abudawood expressed his deep gratitude for the large number of participants in attendance at the meeting. Their attendance was a clear indication of the need to support and encourage more activities of this type.

Speaking on behalf of UNIDO, Mr. Herbert May, Director of the Special Programmes and Activities Division and Head of the UNIDO delegation, welcomed the participants to the meeting and thanked them for their support and contribution towards the preparation of the meeting. He expressed UNIDO's thanks to the Union of Chambers of Commerce, Industry, Maritime Commerce and Commodity Exchanges of Turkey (UCCET), and to the Government and people of Turkey for having accepted to host the meeting and for their very generous hospitality. He also expressed thanks to the co-sponsoring organization, the Islamic Chamber of Commerce, Industry and Commodity Exchange (ICCICE), for the very harmonious working relations with UNIDO throughout the preparations for the meeting and for their active assistance in mobilizing the excellent response and participation of its member countries.

Since its creation, UNIDO has actively promoted economic and technical co-operation among developing countries in the industrial field as an instrument for collective self-reliance and self-sustaining development among developing countries. To this end, enterprise-to-enterprise co-operation has been one of the priority programmes of UNIDO, with particular emphasis on the sharing of experiences between the more industrially advanced of the developing countries and the less advanced ones.

Referring to the meeting, Mr. May explained that it fitted well with the overall emphasis being given to enterprise-to-enterprise co-operation through the transfer of technology and know-how, equity participation, external marketing, training and financing through mediumand long-term loans at favourable conditions or through leasing and buy-back arrangements. He also referred to plant rehabilitation as an area where the more advanced Islamic countries such as Turkey could provide very significant assistance to other Islamic countries. The holding of the meeting in Turkey would thus provide an opportunity for Turkish industrialists to exhibit some of the industrial and technical capacities and capabilities that the country could offer.

Mr. May then extended a particular welcome to the financial institutions and expressed the hope that their presence would lead to the financing of as many joint venture projects as possible. He went on to explain about the UNIDO Trust Fund arrangements by which projects may be financed either by the developing country itself (known as Self-Financed) or by a third-party donor (known as Trust-Fund Donor). Through such arrangements UNIDO can provide its services for the purchases of equipment and spare parts as well as for the award of contracts.

In his statement, OIC Secretary General, Syed Sharifuddin Pirzada thanked the Government of Turkey and UCCET. He praised the efforts being made by Turkey towards the promotion of economic co-operaticin among OIC Member States. He expressed the need for the private and the public sector of Islamic countries to work together for the development of their respective countries.

He referred to the General Agreement on Economic, Technical and Commercial Co-operation and the Agreement on Promotion, Protection and Gurantee of Investment among OIC Member State and to the progress so far achieved by COMCEC for closer economic ties.

Recalling the role of the Islamic Chamber, and its efforts with the Islamic Development Bank (IDB) for the promotion of joint venture projects, he expressed his gratitude to UNIDO, ICCICE and UCCET for convening this meeting. He expressed his conviction that the meeting would encourage further multilateral and bilateral relations among the businessmen of the Islamic countries, and that the result of the meeting would make a significant contribution to the Third Ministerial Consultation on Industrial Co-operation of the OIC Member States scheduled from 27-28 June 1987 in Istanbul.

Mr. Mustafa Sirin, on behalf of the COMCEC Coordination Office, Under-Secretry of State Planning Organization of Turkey, summarized the coordinated efforts in the field of joint ventures within the OIC. He expressed his gratitude to the organizers of this meeting which constitutes a realization of a decision taken by the COMCEC. Stressing the need for the promotion of joint venture among Islamic countries, Mr. Sirin gave a brief description of Turkey's technical assistance programme to the drought stricken African countries. In this connection, Mr. Sirin explained that among the countries presenting projects at this meeting, five of them were among those African countries mentior. d in the above programme. The amounts allocated to these countries within the framework of Turkey's technical assistance programme could be used to finance those joint venture projects that may be the subject of agreement between the respective delegations and the Turkish investors.

In conclusion, Mr. Sirin reviewed the background leading to the meeting for the promotion of joint ventures among the OIC Member States. He cited the Plan of Action to Strengthen Economic Co-operation among the Member States of the OIC adopted by the Third Islamic Summit held in Mecca in January 1981, the First Ministerial Consultation on Industrial

Co-operation, held in Islamabad in February 1982, the first session of the Standing Committee for Economic and Commercial Co-operation among OIC Member States, held in November 1984, and the Second session of the COMCEC (March 1986), all of which lent support to the promotion of joint venture among Islamic countries. He explained that the result of the present joint venture meeting would be an input to the Third Ministerial Consultation on Industrial Co-operation of the OIC Member States, to be held from 27-28 June 1987 in Istanbul.

Mr. Haman Djoda, Chief of the Cameroonian delegation, speaking on behalf of all the delegates to the meeting, thanked the Government of the Republic of Turkey for having accepted to host this meeting in the magnificient and historical city of Istanbul. Each delegation has been very touched by the warm and generous hospitality extended to the participants. He extended thanks to UNIDO, the ICCICE and UCCET for initiating such a meeting for the promotion of co-operation among less-developed and more-advanced Islamic countries. He also extended the delegations' gratitude to the financial institutions present. He indicated that each promoter had come with one or several projects or project ideas, and with the hope of finding either a technical partner or a financial partner or both.

With the on-going economic crisis, and the smaller states being more and more impoverished, the private sector is increasingly being called upon to launch small-and medium-size enterprises, provide job opportunities and added-value, and at the same time process raw materials. That is why by providing this occasion to the economic partners of the different countries to meet, UNIDO is playing a much appreciated catalytic role of industrialization of young countries. This unique meeting from which all Islamic countries are expecting concrete results is in line with the new dynamism given to our co-operation by His Excellency General Kenan Evren, President of the Turkish Republic and Head of the Permanent Committee for the Economic Co-operation of the OIC. The representative of Cameroon concluded by expressing the deep and profound gratitude of all participants to the Government and the people of Turkey.

The President of UCCET, Mr. Ali Coskun, read out the contents of a cable addressed to the Meeting by H.E. Turgut Ozal, Prime Minister of Turkey, which reads as follows:

"I wish to acknowledge the receipt of your invitation to the Meeting for Promotion of Joint Ventures for the enhancement of economic solidarity among the Islamic countries. Thank you very much. With my sincerest wishes for successful and fruitful results in accordance to its aims, I extend to you all my heartfalt greetings."

### Election of Bureau

The Meeting agreed that its proceedings be jointly co-chaired by Mr. Ali Coskun, President of the Board of the Union of Chambers of Commerce, Industry, Maritime Commerce and Commodity Exchanges of Turkey (UCCET) and Sheikh Ismail Abudawood, President of the Islamic Chamber of Commerce, Industry and Commodity Exchange (ICCICE). Prof. Dr. Sebahattin Zaim, Advisor to the President of UCCET, was unanimously elected as Rapporteur.

# Presentation of country project proposals and assistance possibilities of financial institutions

During the second plenary session on Monday, 15 June 1987, the representatives of the eight less developed Islamic countries -Bangladesh, Cameroon, Gambia, Guinea, Mali, Niger, Comalia and Yemen Arab Republic - provided ample information on the current economic and investment policies of their countries and explained the scope and nature of the project proposals submitted to the meeting. A total of about 110 joint venture projects was submitted to the meeting by the 8 countries mentioned above.

The above presentation was followed by presentations by some of the financial institutions present at the meeting:

The representative of the Islamic Development Bank highlighted the role being played by the IDB in the economic development of Islamic countries. Emphasizing the importance of joint venture projects and the incentives provided by IDB for their implementation, he explained the various technical and financial assistance possibilities available to the public and private sectors of Islamic countries in the identification and preparation of investment projects.

He also explained the conditions set forth by the Bank for the financing of projects, which include the submission of a detailed feasibility study as well as an official request by the Government of the sponsor. Priority in the financing is given to projects which promote and strengthen economic co-operation among member countries of IDB.

He also stressed the key role to be played by IDB and National Development Finance Institutions in the promotion of project-based co-operation. He recalled the Second Ministerial Consultation on Industrial Co-operation among Islamic countries which recommended NDFIs to serve as country coordinators in receiving and disseminating information on co-operation possibilities.

The private sector has been given a key role in industrial co-operation among the member states of the Organization of Islamic Conference (OIC). Hence, the National Chambers of Commerce and Industry should act as spokesman for the private sector at the national level. The National chambers must in turn forge strong links with the Islamic Chamber of Commerce (ICCICE) and form an effective multi-channel of communication between the various National Chambers of Commerce in the Member States. Accordingly, the ICCICE will act as a channel of dissemination of information on joint ventures among all the Member States, the OIC and IDB.

The representative of the National Development Finance Corporation (NDFC) of Pakistan, made . presentation on the assistance possibilities available from his orgnization. Besides operating a Development Banking Training Institute, the NDFC also has Management Consultancy Services and associated leasing companies; and is capable of providing joint venture capital for various industrial projects. The NDFC is particularly interested in considering joint venture projects relating to sugar production, textile manufacture, rehabilitation and plant modernization, as well as in the paint industry. In addition, the NDFC offers training facilities and technial know-how in project appraisal and allied fields upon request.

### Closing of the Meeting

The Meeting for the Promotion of Joint Venture among Islamic Countries was concluded on 18 June 1987. The meeting adopted the draft report, and requested UNIDO to finalize, edit, reproduce and circulate the final report to all participants, all Islamic Chambers of Commerce and Industry and to all Islamic financial institutions.

The meeting also resolved to place on record its high appreciation to UCCET for the hospitality and the excellent arrangements made for the conduct of the meeting, and extended very hearty thanks through UCCET to the Government and people of Turkey.

Closing statements were made by Mr. Kowara, Vice-Chairman, ICCICE, South-East Asia Region; Mr. Alioune Dat, Secretary General, ICCICE; Mr. Herbert May, Director, Special Programmes and Activities Division, UNIDO; Mr. Mahfuzul Islam, Bangladesh; and Mr. Ali Coskun, President, UCCET.

In his closing statement, made on behalf of Sheikh Ismail Abudawood, President of ICCICE, Mr. Kowara thanked UNIDO for the assistance extended to ICCICE and thanked UCCET for the excellent arrangements made in hosting the meeting. He referred to the many joint venture agreements that had been made at the meeting, and expressed the hope that UNIDO, ICCICE and UCCET would jointly undertake the administrative and other arrangements necessary to ensure the speedy implementation of the agreements.

He also referred to the conclusions and recommendations made by the meeting, and requested that the three organizations (UNIDO, ICCICE and UCCET) should take necessary steps to translate them into concrete projects. In this regard, he urged the Islamic countries to mobilize their resources, capacities and capabilities in order that the follow-up actions required are successfully carried out.

The Secretary General of ICCICE, Mr. Alioune Dat, thanked UNIDO for the technical assistance provided to ICCICE, and thus to the Member States of the OIC. He stressed the need to foster and strengthen intra-Islamic co-operation in order to overcome the deteriorating world economic climate which is putting severe burdens and strains on the young economies of the Islamic countries. The present meeting was a first and important step towards economic co-operation, collective self-reliance, and industrial/economic integration of OIC Member States. He indicated that similar meetings would be organized within the framework of collaboration and co-operation between UNIDO and the ICCICE.

He concluded by calling upon the Islamic financial institutions to play a major role in financing the implementation of joint venture agreements reached at the meeting; and requested member Governments to open up channels to provide necessary incentives for promoting joint ventures among Islamic States.

Mr. Herbert May expressed UNIDO's appreciation of the enthusiastic and lively discussions that took place at the meeting, and which was an indication of the importance attached to industrial co-operation through joint venture arrangements by the participants. He thanked UCCET for their hospitality and the excellent organizational arrangements for the meeting, and expressed the hope for future UNIDO/ICCICE joint endevours for the promotion of industrial co-operation among the Islamic countries.

Referring to the success of the meeting. as may be measured by the number of projects promoted and agreements reached, Mr. May cautioned that much work still had to be done by UNIDO, ICCICE and UCCET to ensure the speedy and successful implementation of the agreements reached. He requested co-operating partners to keep UNIDO, ICCICE and UCCET informed of the progress towards implementation of the projects. He indicated that UNIDO, despite its present financial constraints, would be prepared to explore the possibility of providing some catalytic assistance that might be necessary to speed up joint venture actions. Assistance might include areas such as project preparation, pre-investment and opportunity studies, <u>ad hoc</u> expert services.

Mr. May concluded by referring to a proposed UNIDO comprehensive programme of support to the agro- and agro-based industries in Africa. He indicated that exploratory project identification missions would be fielded soon, and requested African delegates present at the meeting to communicate any projects or project ideas in this area to UNIDO.

Speaking on behalf of all the participants at the meeting, Mr. Mahfuzul Islam of Bangladesh referred to the meeting as the first really practical step towards promoting industrial and economic co-operation among the Islamic countries. He thanked UNIDO, ICCICE and UCCET for organizing the meeting which brought together private entrepreneurs, financial institutions, project sponsors, government representatives, etc. to discuss specific projects and to examine ways and means of promoting joint venture arrangements by mobilizing and channeling the resources available within Islamic countries.

He promised, on behalf of all participants, that every endeavour would be taken to guarantee an effective follow-up action on the projects and agreements reached. He concluded by thanking UCCET and the Government and people of Turkey for the exellent hospitality and excellent arrangements made for the meeting.

The President of UCCET, Mr. Ali Coskun, thanked participants for the excellent and business-like approach adopted at the meeting, which led to its successful conclusion and achievement of its objective of promoting joint venture co-operation among Islamic countries. He thanked UNIDO and ICCICE for their contribution towards the organization of the meeting and thanked the delegations and financial institutions for their very active participation. He extended very hearty thanks to the Turkish companies and industrial and financial institutions for the support extended to UCCET both in the organization of the meeting and through their participation in the meeting itself.

Mr. Coskun referred to the imbalance in the link trade, international investments and technological accumulation, all of which have tended to favour the industrialized countries. One of the possible approaches for developing countries, like the Islamic countries, to narrow the gap is mutual self-reliance, through economic, industrial, commercial and technological co-operation among themselves. The meeting for the promotion of joint venture among Islamic countries had provided the first concrete steps towards achieving the above goal. The meeting has proved beyond all doubt that there is great potential for co-operation among Islamic countries in every field. He concluded by assuring participants that UCCET and the entire Turkish industry would do everything possible to promote and strengthen industrial co-operation with and among all brotherly Islamic countries.

### II. SUMMARY OF BILATERAL DISCUSSIONS ON INDUSTRIAL PROJECTS

A detailed project by project summary of the results of the bilateral discussions is given in Annex II.

The results reflect a high degree of active participation by all participants at the meeting. Of the 110 industrial projects considered by the meeting, joint venture agreements and/or agreements in principle were reached on 79 projects. And of the 79, Memoranda of Understanding were signed for 15 projects.

The projects discussed and the joint venture agreements reached cover such areas as pre-investment studies, including feasibility and pre-feasibility studies; project design; rehabilitation and expansion of existing plants; equipment supply; provision of soft loans; equity participation; etc.

The success of the meeting indicates that the potential for economic and technical co-operation among developing countries clearly exists. Besides the agreements reached during the meeting itself, many participants saw their participation and the contacts made during the meeting as being very positive and fruitful, particularly in future joint venture possibilities.

### III. RECOMMENDATIONS

### 1. Recommendation for Action by Co-operating Parties

- a) Co-operating parties of the projects, specially investors and businessmen should make the necessary arrangements for the realisation of these projects. They should further examine ways and means for the implementation of the specific projects discussed at the Istanbul Meeting.
- b) Each of the co-operating parties should, where appropriate, contact financial and investment institutions such as the Islamic Development Bank, the African Development Bank, the Asian Development Bank, the IFC as well as national and other development banks to mobilize the resources for implementation of agreed projects.
- c) For projects where the amount of financing required from the Islamic Development Bank is less than 2 million Islamic Dinars, co-operating partners should approach the national development financing institutions where the IDB has extended lines of equity or leasing. Projects requiring financing of more than 2 million Islamic Dinars from the IDB may be forwarded to the Bank through the office of the IDB Governor in the Member Country concerned, along with a recent feasibility study.
- d) The advanced Islamic countries are invited to provide to the less developed Islamic countries all technical co-operation and financial assistance necessary for the implementation of projects agreed upon at the meeting.
- e) Relevant aspects of ECDC/TCDC should be incorporated into national development plans and national TCDC focal points should be strengthened by providing them with adequate staff and funds.
- f) Measures should be adopted to incorporate TCDC components into UNDP financed country programmes and a certain amount of UNDP/IPF resources should be allocated for use in implementation of TCDC projects/activities.

## 2. <u>Recommendation for Action by Regional Organizations and</u> Financial Institutions

- a) Regional and sub-regional organizations of Islamic countries are invited to provide support, to the extent possible, towards implementation of identified projects.
- b) Financial institutions such as the Islamic Development Bank, African Development Bank, Arab Fund for Economic and Social Development, Arab Bank for Economic Development in Africa, Asian Development Bank, etc. are invited to provide financial assistance towards the implementation of identified projects.
- c) Regional and sub-regional organizations are urged to seek increased support for ECDC/TCDC activities through, <u>inter alia</u>, supplementary resources from potential donor countries and financial institutions.

### 3. Recommendation for Action by UNIDO, ICCICE and UCCET

- a) The participants stressed the need for continuing support from UNIDO and other UN and inter-governmental bodies in promoting ECDC/TCDC activities.
- b) UNIDO should provide technical assistance to co-operating parties to help them take appropriate follow-up action for the implementation of identified projects.
- c) In view of the important role that the Trust Funds are playing in technical co-operation among developing countries, UNIDO should, through such Trust Fund arrangements, assist the public or private industrial sector in implementation of projects.
- d) UNIDO, ICCICE and UCCET should identify institutions and enterprises in more advanced developing countries that can provide expertise, technologies and equipment for co-operation with the less developed countries.

- e) UNIDO, ICCICE and UCCET should monitor the implementation of projects identified in the meeting. For this, the co-operating partners should provide the necessary information to UNIDO, ICCICE and UCCET.
- f) In view of the positive results obtained from the meeting, UNIDO in co-operation with ICCICE, should organize similar meetings to promote joint venture/industrial co-operation among Islamic countries.
- g) The report of the meeting should be reproduced and widely circulated among participating countries and organizations and firms, as well as among investment and financial institutions which may be in a position to finance projects.
